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INTRODUCTION

NEPCon is an international, non-profit organisation that delivers sustainability services and engages in innovation projects to facilitate the transformation of business practices and consumer behaviour to promote the responsible use of natural resources. The purpose of this report is to document performance of *Tangshan Sanyou Xingda Chemical Fibre Co. Ltd.* hereafter referred to as "Company", against the requirements of the Verification Framework and Guidelines, (February 2019 version¹) and guidance documents² developed by Canopy and approved, supported and requested by the CanopyStyle Fashion and Textile Leaders for Forest Conservation (Leaders Group)³ and the over 200 brands, retailers and designers looking to implement their sourcing policies for man-made cellulosic textiles. The focus of this verification audit is to manage the risk and avoid sourcing from ancient and endangered forests and other controversial sources and implement other sustainable sourcing measures, across the supply chain from the point of wood harvesting in forests and/or plantations and through to the brand and retail customers. Man-made cellulosic fibre (MMCF) producers, are required to document and provide evidence towards a set of pre-defined social and environmental criteria and key progress indicators as part of the CanopyStyle initiative.

The audit presents the findings of NEPCon auditors who have evaluated company systems and performance against the applicable standard(s). Section 4 below provides the evaluation conclusions. The auditor reviewed and used Canopy's map of ancient and endangered forests, which has been overlaid with the sourcing regions and list of suppliers of the company, as well as further guidance document such as a Dissolving Pulp mill Classification⁴, to assess the level of risk.

1. GENERAL DESCRIPTION

1.1 Company overview

Tangshan Sanyou Xingda Chemical Fibre Co. Ltd is one of the worlds' five largest manufacturers of man-made cellulosic fibre by production capacity. It is a subsidiary of Tangshan Sanyou Group, which owns 13 subsidiary companies, such as Alkali Industry, Sanyou Chemical, Sanyou Chlor-alkali, Sanyou Silicon, etc, and its main products are soda ash, viscose staple fibre, and PVCs, etc.

The Company owns a sub-company - Tangshan Sanyou Yuanda Chemical Fibre Co. Ltd, two manufacturing mill sites - Xingda mill and Yuanda mill, both located in Tangshan. The total annual productivity is 800,000 tons, products include high whiteness fibre for non-woven, color fibre, modal fibre, fine denier fiber (1.2D*38mm) and bamdal fibre, etc. The Company is FSC CoC certified (SGSHK-COC-330228), also certified against ISO 9001, ISO 14001, OHSAS and OEKO-TEX. The company has been participating in the CanopyStyle Initiative since 2015 and underwent first audit in December 2016.

Two mills:

Xingda Mill

There are 1424 employees working in the factory. The facilities are equipped with totally automated process control systems, and consists of 6 lines with a total production capacity of 180,000 t/a HT fiber and NW fiber. The Company is also processing anhydrous sodium sulfate which is widely used in the detergent, glass, textile dyeing, and pulp and paper industries in the domestic as well as international market.

Yuanda Mill

There are 2996 employees working in the factory. The facilities are equipped with totally automated process control systems, and consists of 8 lines with a total production capacity of 620,000 t/a HT fiber and NW fiber. The Company is also processing anhydrous sodium sulfate which is widely used in the detergent, glass, textile dyeing, and pulp and paper industries in the domestic as well as international market.

2.3 Description of Overall Audit Process

Desktop audit to the Corporate office:

On 21st August, the auditor conducted desktop audit by reviewing the documented evidences provided by Tangshan Sanyou HQ.

Before evaluation, the company sent the auditor a number of documents several times. The auditor also communicated and confirmed with the company about the validity of some documents.

When completing the evaluation, auditor explained the main findings to the Company.

Short notice audit to the viscose mill:

NEPCo announced the short-notice audit on 11th December 2019.

In the afternoon of 12th December, the auditor started the onsite audit with an opening meeting with the presence of top management and the key staff in all departments. The objective and scope of the audit, agenda, conflict of interest (COI) issues, etc were introduced by the auditor. Also, the management representative gave a brief introduction of the Company and operation activities it involves.

Following the opening meeting, the auditor interviewed the management team on the practices and strategic plan on Canopy policy commitment.

After interviews, related documents were reviewed, such as Wood Fibre Sourcing Policy and operational procedures, purchase documents (invoices, packing list, bill of lading etc.), Risk Assessment Reports, Training Plan and records, communication with the suppliers, etc.

Then, the auditor toured the company's two mills including the production line and warehouses.

In combination with reviewing documents and visiting the company's facilities, the auditor interviewed the staff from various departments: production, warehouse, EHS, R&D, HR, purchase, labor union.

The closing meeting was held at the office at 11:00am of 13th December 2019 with the presence of the management. During the meeting the main findings were presented and explained to the Company.

4. EVALUATION RESULT

4.1 Evaluation Conclusion

Positive findings:

Tanshan Sanyou has developed a sourcing policy in line with CanopyStyle initiative and communicated this policy with all suppliers. The standard operational procedure was developed by the HQ and implemented company wide.

The Company has made significant improvements in their systems to comply with the CanopyStyle audit, particularly in the areas of training, Leadership Group engagement, risk assessment, and commitments to increase the % of FSC certified materials.

In addition to these system improvements, Tangshan Sanyou succeeded in producing viscose staple fiber made from 50% post-consumer recycled cotton textiles. Also, in 2019, the company positively participates in an afforestation program in a desert area in China.

Areas for improvement:

The Company made significant attempts to collect information from their suppliers on forest or plantation of origin, but often received only enough information to locate the dissolving pulp mill location. Therefore, sometimes origin of material is only known at a country level, creating a broad sourcing area with potential overlap with ancient and endangered forests. More information on forest of origin is needed to understand if these mills are in fact sourcing from ancient and endangered forests or controversial sources.

Prior to the audit, Canopy shared an advice note (effective 1 June 2019) that introduces a new tool (Dissolving Pulp Mill Classification) to be used in addition to the Forest Mapper when conducting risk assessments for sourcing from ancient and endangered forests. The new tool outlines commonly used dissolving pulp mills and a determination of risk considering priority ancient and endangered forests. In comparing the company risk assessment with the new Canopy classification tool, there are differing in risk results:

The Company has made great efforts to conduct a risk assessment on sourcing from ancient and endangered sources, but more assessment is needed for controversial sources. The Company sources from many forest management units that are plantations, and information has been requested on the establishment date of these plantations, but not much information has been received.




Air emissions management

At Altri, the atmospheric emissions associated with the production process are scrupulously monitored, according to the conditions established in the environmental licenses of each production unit.

Fossil CO2 Emissions

In 2018, Altri emitted a total of 120,274,495 kg of fossil CO₂. Total GHG emissions increased by 22% in 2018 compared to 2016. This increase is due to the increase in Caima's emissions from the start-up of the new boiler (2016 - 39,140 tCO₂e vs 2017 - 20,361 tCO₂e vs 2018 - 93,088 tCO₂e). In 2018, specific emissions also increased by 13% compared to 2016, from 100 kg fossil CO₂ / tps to 113 kg fossil CO₂ / tps.



Carbon footprint

In 2018, Altri carried out an intensive study aimed at quantifying Altri's total 439 kg CO₂ / tps, distributed in the three areas of emissions, and Scope 3 (90%).

The avoided emissions (energy produced internally and supplied by the grid).


Manager interviews and supplier control procedure confirmed the Company will give preference for FSC certified suppliers, and suppliers that have management measures to protect forest and peatlands.

In section 6.6 of supplier evaluation procedure, it's defined that the company will purchase material from suppliers involving in forest protection program, but the implementation of the procedure needs supporting evidences and further verification.

13th December 2019 updated:

The supplier evaluation has taken into consideration the availability of the forest protection program implemented by the suppliers. However, the solid evidences of Ancient and endangered forest protection program were not provided by the suppliers. For some of them, the evidences provided is for support responsible/sustainable forest management certification, forest regeneration or comply with international or local regulations rather than protection plan of ancient and endangered forests.

For example, Enrocell provided the 2018 annual Sustainability report mentioning forest certification coverage for owned and managed lands was 96% and the forests and plantations where harvested are duly regenerated.



Forest regeneration

We always ensure that the forests and plantations where we harvest wood are duly regenerated. This is often done through active planting or sowing, although in many areas active regeneration is complemented by natural seed dispersal from nearby forests, by leaving seed trees standing in the harvesting area, or by coppicing. Whatever the methods used, we always ensure the forest will regenerate.



The Veracel Station rainforest research and conservation centre celebrated twenty years of operation in 2018.

Recommendations for Tangshan Sanyou's continuous improvement

Canopy applauds Tangshan Sanyou for completing its 2nd verification audit, for demonstrating deep engagement with suppliers to identify fibre sourcing and mitigate any potential risks in the supply chain. The company is also showing clear leadership in piloting new recycled pulp and scaling these new products to commercial scale. These are important measures to ensure compliance with your Dissolving Wood Pulp Sourcing Policy.

Canopy 祝贺唐山三友完成了第二次年审，与供应商展开了深度沟通，对原材料寻根溯源，以消除供应链中的任何潜在风险。唐山三友亦充分展现行业领导力，试用新型回收浆粕，并推出新产品至商业规模。这些都是确保合规溶解木浆采购政策的重要举措。

The CanopyStyle audit is a learning opportunity, and in the spirit of continuous improvement, additional actions can be taken over time to fully implement Tangshan Sanyou's policy commitments. Based on the review of the 2nd audit report, Canopy recommends the following next steps:

1. Adoption of ambitious public targets and timelines for increasing the use of next generation alternative fibres in a commercially competitive way;

制定和公开宏大目标，并给出时间期限，即提高下一代替代性纤维材料的使用，且具有商业竞争力。

2. Continue to use Forest Mapper and complementary guidance documents such as the advice note of Ancient and Endangered Forests and the Dissolving pulp Classification to complete and share a risk assessment for all fiber supply inputs.

继续使用 ForestMapper 和补充性指南文件（例如《原始濒危森林采购审核通知》和《溶解浆厂评估文件》），以完成和分享所有原料供应的风险评估。

3. For suppliers with potential risk of sourcing from key priority areas of Ancient and Endangered forests, continue to engage dissolving pulp suppliers, with Canopy's support, to gain clarity on risk level and/or risk mitigation measures and work towards elimination of all risk;

对于存在从原始濒危森林重点地区采购的潜在风险供应商，需继续与相关溶解浆供应商沟通，明确采购风险及/或风控措施，致力于消除所有风险。对此，Canopy 也会给予协助。

4. Develop and implement a procedure with suppliers to identify the initial date of the plantation and avoid plantation post 1994 non FSC 100% certified.

与供应商一道制定和执行一项工作安排，以确定种植林的创建时间，避免从 1994 年之后开发和没有 FSC100%认证的种植林采购。

5. Increase the amount of FSC fibre used, with a preference for fibre from FSC certified forests (FSC 100%);

提高 FSC 认证材料的使用量，优先选择来自 FSC 认证森林(FSC 100%)的原材料。

6. Build on the company's engagement in the Initiative to include advocacy actions for the conservation of key priority forest regions;

公司在参与 CanopyStyle 行动的同时，也会以实际行动倡导保护重要森林地区。

7. Adoption of best in class processing technologies. Work with experts in the field to implement, for all sites, pollution control technologies to limit their impact. Implement the new ZDHC MMCF guidelinesⁱⁱ for chemical management, which give suppliers unified criteria for measuring output indicators like wastewater, sludge, air emissions and other process-related parameters.

使用最优的生产处理技术。与相应领域专家合作，在所有生产场所均使用污染控制技术，控制工厂污染。实施最新的 ZDHC MMCF 化学品管理指南，为供应商提供统一的排污标准，包括废水、废液、废气和其它与生产环节相关的指标。

8. Ensure that all bamboo fibre inputs are 100% FSC certified.

确保所有竹纤维原材料具有 100%FSC 认证。

As mentioned in the CanopyStyle audit framework, ongoing audits and/or random site visits will be essential to ensure that Tangshan Sanyou continues to implement their policy and meets the expectations of the CanopyStyle Initiative.
